## **PCI**

Pastoral Crisis Intervention (PCI) is a combination of faith-based resources and traditional crisis intervention techniques.

### **Why take this course?**

Clergy and lay persons are often trained well in seminary for teaching and preaching, however they may lack skills to minister when a crisis situation arises. The purpose of this course is to explore, teach, and apply these skills to crisis situations.

## About the Course

The PCI I and PCI II combined course is being sponsored by the Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy and the City of North Charleston. The course was co-authored by the Rev. Rob Dewey shortly before the September 11th terrorist attacks.

The course addresses how to assist individuals or communities during a time of crisis, and it examines the impact that crisis situations have upon people, whether it is a psychological and/or spiritual impact. Participants will receive continuing education credit from the University of Maryland.

## Course Faculty

**The Rev. Rob Dewey**, an Episcopal priest and Senior Chaplain for the Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy, along with **Chaplain Eddie Driggers**, Deputy Senior Chaplain with the Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy, will be the instructors. Chaplain Dewey started the CCC in 1990 and was the first full-time crisis/police Chaplain in South Carolina. Chaplain Driggers is the former Assistant Sheriff of Charleston County and has 31 years of law enforcement experience. The ministry serves 36 emergency service agencies, and citizens of the Lowcountry. In 2010, the Chaplaincy's two full time staff Chaplains and 19 volunteer Chaplains responded to over 1,538 calls.

Chaplain Dewey's 20 years of experience in crisis situations afforded him the opportunity to respond with DMORT to the 9/11 terrorist attacks in New York City and to Hurricane Katrina. He also serves as a Chaplain with the State Law Enforcement Division, ATF, and the FBI.
